

Joining forces for Active Offer of Integrated Health Services to **Seniors** in Official Language Minority Communities.

**Position Paper**<sup>1</sup>

## **Background**

"As Canada's population ages and chronic disease rates increase, Canadians need access to more health care services outside the traditional settings such as physicians' offices and hospitals. Across Canada, all jurisdictions are putting in place new approaches to enhance access to vital health care and support services at home and in the community, and reduce reliance on more expensive hospital infrastructure."<sup>2</sup>

But what about active offer of health and social services in French<sup>3</sup> for Francophone seniors? As of the 2016 Census, of the roughly 1 million Francophones living in Francophone minority communities, **200,465 were age 65 or older**.<sup>4</sup>

## **Shared responsibility**

"Active offer relies on shared accountability at several levels and requires partners to exercise appropriate leadership with respect to health services in French." <sup>5</sup> That is why we want to encourage the various stakeholders in the system to:

- Develop a common vision to ensure the delivery of integrated health services that are safe, of high quality, and culturally and linguistically appropriate;
- Mobilize key stakeholders, including the Anglophone and Francophone partners, to meet the specific needs of the aging community;
- Promote collaborative leadership in planning
   French-language care and services for Francophone seniors in French-language minority communities.


## **Key messages**

Here are some practical solutions that need to be considered in order to improve access to health and social services in French for Francophone seniors in Canada:

- Expand the availability of bilingual human resources both through staff recruitment and retention policies and through in-house training and internships.
- Emphasize the risks that a lack of access to integrated, high-quality care and services in French poses to Francophone seniors' health and safety.
- Promote a collaborative approach that makes the best use
  of everyone's particular strengths and expertise to achieve a
  shared objective focused on individual wellness and community
  development.
- Engage Francophone seniors in solutions tailored to their needs at every stage of the aging process.
- Demonstrate the economic benefits of meeting Francophone seniors' needs.
